
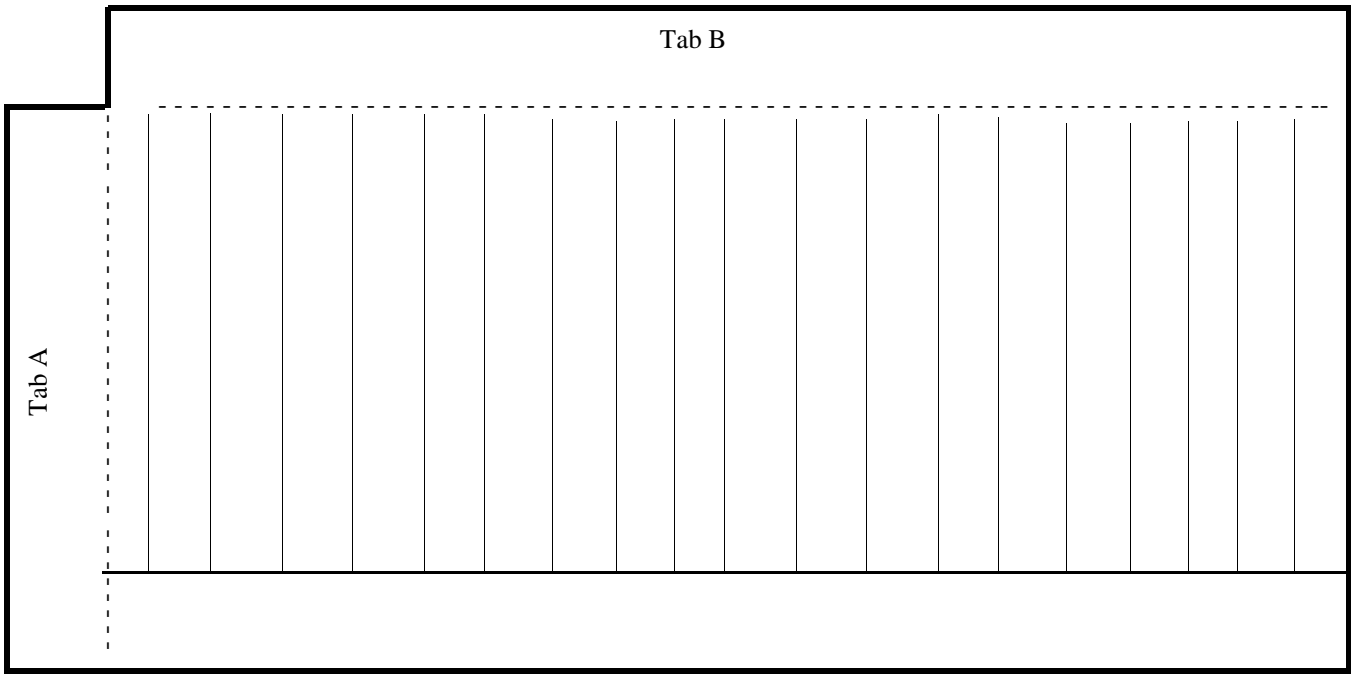


Roof
Cut 1

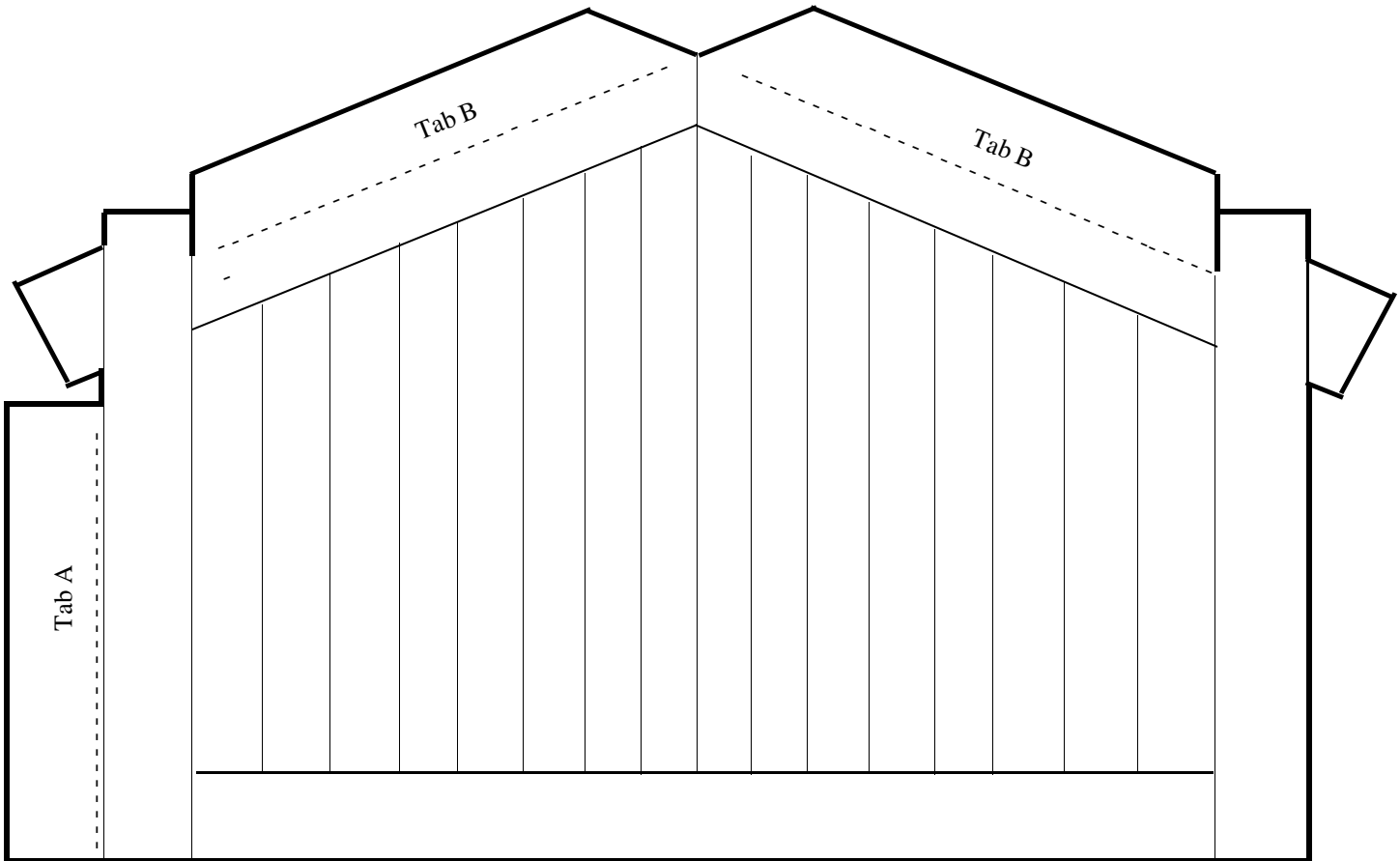
Front Steps
Cut 1

1. Fold along dotted lines.
2. Glue  Tabs under the side walls of the steps in the direction of the arrows.



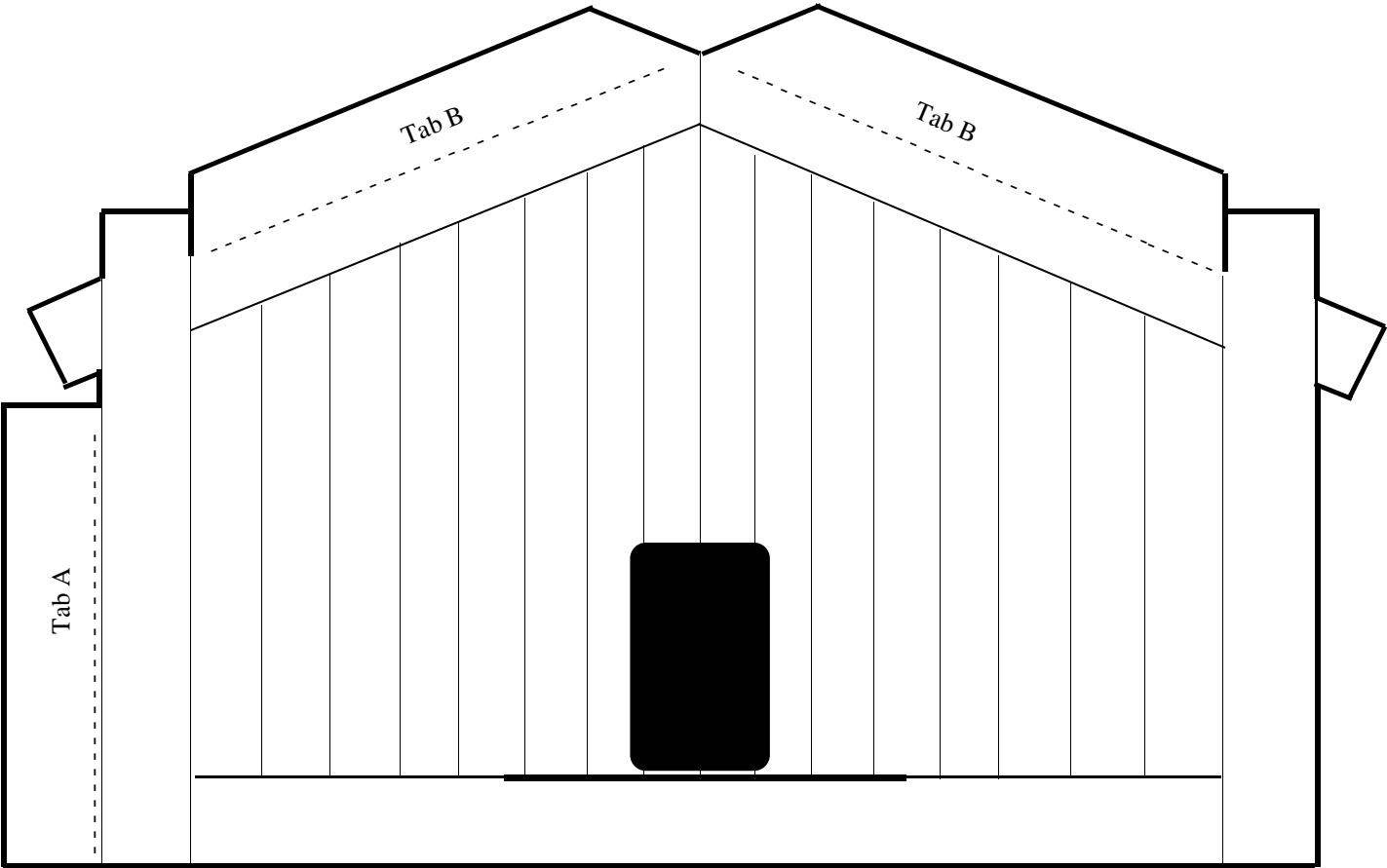
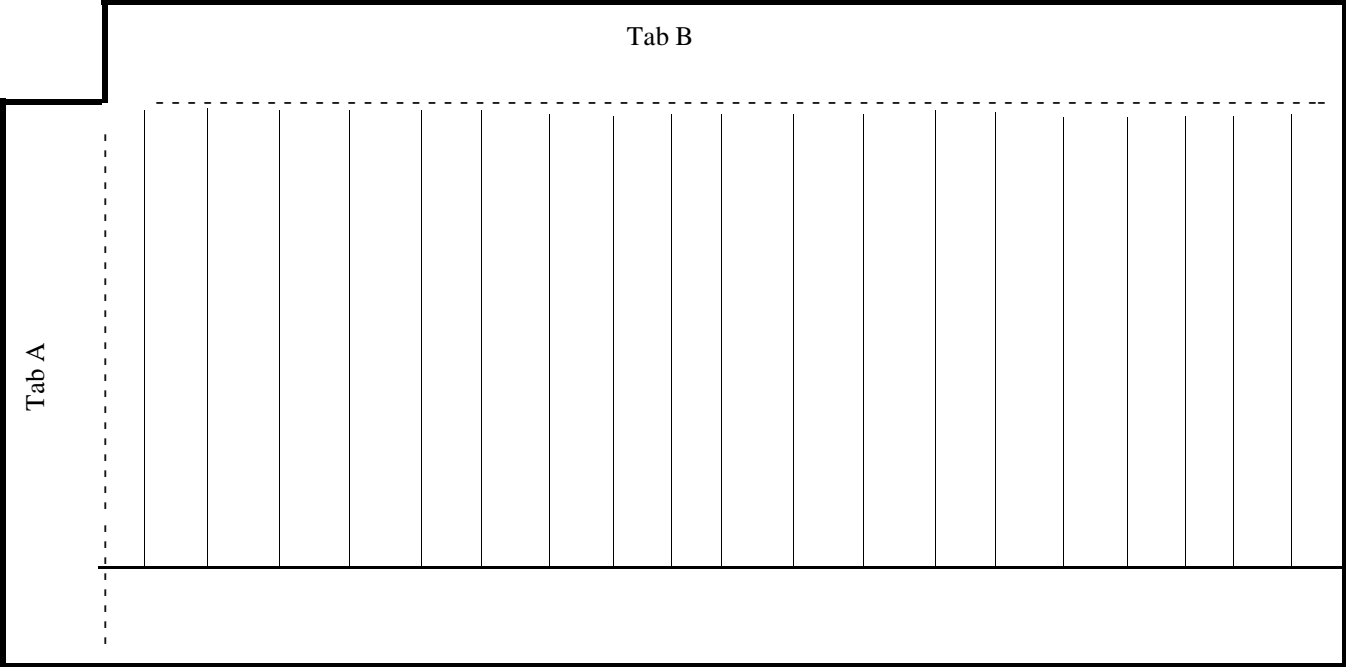


Side Wall A
Cut 1
Fold **Tab A** along dotted line and glue to the inside of the **Front Wall**.
Fold **Tab B** along dotted line and glue to the inside of **Roof**.

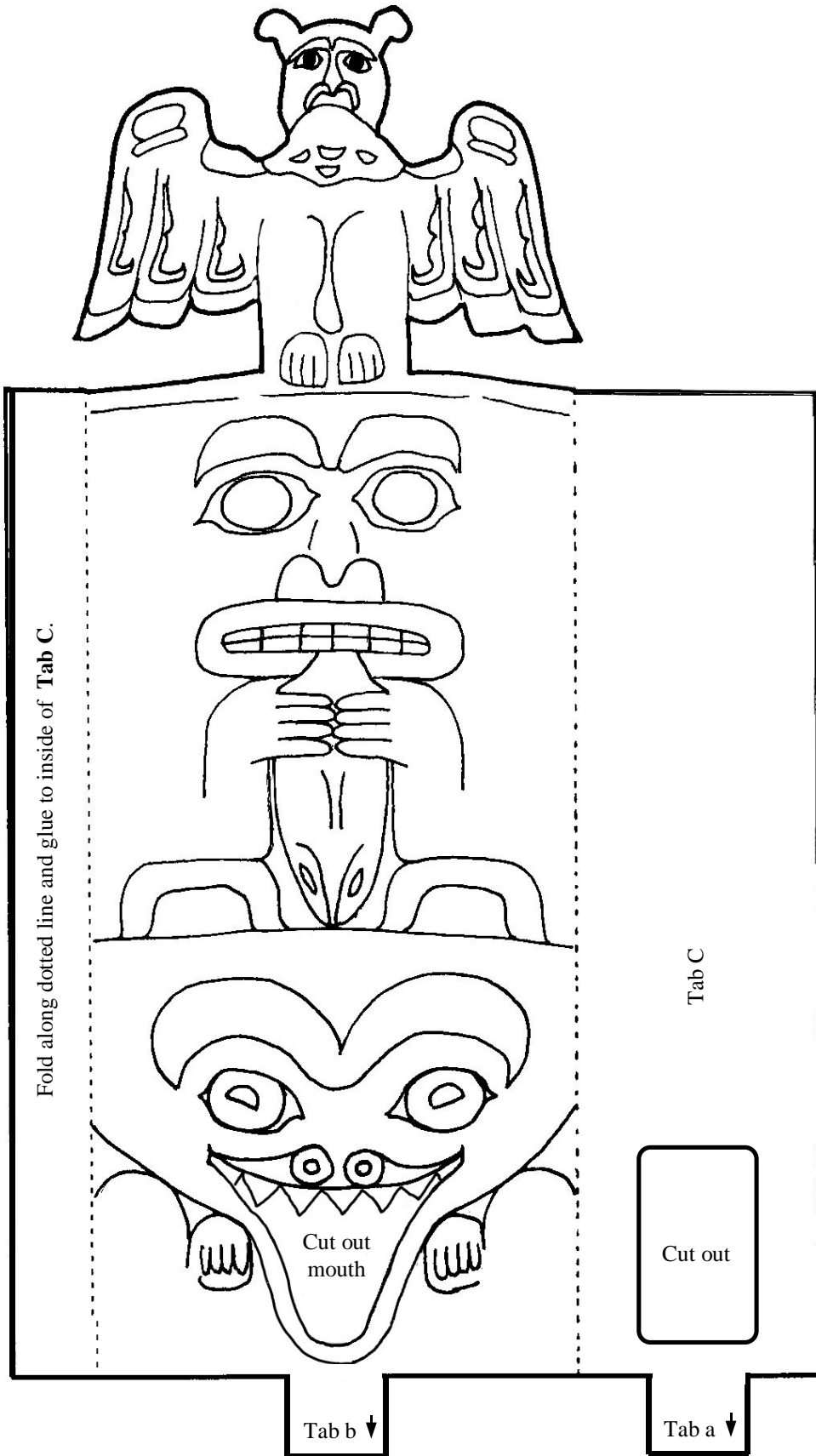


End Wall
Cut 1
Fold **Tab A** along dotted line and glue to the inside of **Side Wall A**.
Fold **Tabs B** along dotted lines and glue to inside of **Roof**.

Side Wall B
Cut 1
Fold **Tab A** along dotted line and glue to inside of **Front-End Wall**.
Fold **Tab B** along dotted line and glue to inside of **Roof**.



Front-End Wall
Cut 1
Fold **Tab A** along dotted line and glue to inside of **Side Wall B**.
Fold **Tabs B** along dotted lines and glue to inside of **Roof**.



Instructions

1. Color the Totem Pole. Black and red were the favorite colors used by the Haida. The Tlingit and Ksan included blue-green with the traditional red and black. The Kwagiutl included green, white and sometimes yellow. Get ideas for designs for the walls of your house, check out these books:

2. Cut along heavy black lines. Be sure to cut out the three sides of the vent in the middle of the roof. You may want to cut out the mouth of the Totem Pole as an entrance to the house.

3. Fold on the dotted lines.

4. Glue Tabs according to directions for each section, starting with Tab A.

5. Totem Pole: Follow directions on totem pole for folding and gluing. Totem Pole will be round in front and flat on the back. Slide tab (a) and (b) into slot (a) and (b) on Front Steps. Align opening on Totem Pole with the doorway of the house.

People

Cut out around solid lines. Fold on the dotted line to form a base for figures to stand.
